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

WALES AND THE HISTORY OF SCIENCE.

Summer/Haf 2018

On the 16th March 2018 the University of Wales Graduates, Bangor Branch, sponsored an open lecture by Professor John V Tucker, entitled Wales and the History of Science. In addition to theoretical computer science, Prof. Tucker, originally from Cardiff, also lectures on the history of computing and on the history of science and technology and Wales. Professor Tucker is a Founding Fellow of the Learned Society of Wales and in July 2010 he was appointed as its inaugural general secretary. You could say he knows his subject! We looked at some of the 'big names' of Science in Wales, many very local

**William Jones** FRS ( developed Pi, Calculus from Llanfihangel, Benllech; 1675-1749,



**Sir William Jones** (son of the above), philologist, learned Sanskrit, a Judge, founded the Asiatic Society, which before its time disdained ideas of racial superiority and shared its discoveries with indigenous Bengali intellectuals.

William Morgan 1750-1833, Actuarial Science, created plasma, from Bridgend;
G H Bryan FRS, 1864 –1928, Aeronautics,

Prof of Maths at Bangor; **Bertrand Russell** OM, FRS, Nobel Prize for Literature.; from Trellech, In September 1961, at the age of 89, Russell was jailed for seven days in Brixton Prison for "breach of peace" after taking part in an anti-nuclear demonstration in London. The magistrate offered to exempt him from jail if he pledged himself to "good behaviour", to which Russell replied: "No, I won't."

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David Edward Hughes, 1831–1900 from Bala, paved the way for the modern microphone. His printing telegraph adopted by Western Union

Edward George Bowen—radar. 1911-1991 'Taffy' Bowen, one of the men who developed radar, and helped win WW2 was born in Swansea, the son of a steelworker. There are more, many more.

Edward Edwards (1803 - 1879), marine zoologist, b. 23 Nov. 1803 at Corwen, he was for some years a draper at Bangor, but in 1840 set up a successful iron-foundry at Menai Bridge. In 1864 he began studying fishes. His researches led him to effect great improvements in the construction of aquaria, and his devices were adopted by the leading museums in Britain and abroad. He died 13 Aug. 1879 (Thanks to a local member for this information).

If we move beyond the 'simple' scientific then what about other notable 'achievers'.

Helen Rowlands, Menai Bridge 1891 - 1955 missionary and linguist. Part of the 150 year long Welsh Calvinistic Methodists' Mission to NE India— the biggest oversea venture ever sustained by Wales. We will explore this further in later publications.

Prof Tucker said that 'Science' is done locally but validated internationally, he further posited the theory that each generation has to re-write history, including what is current. I can think of several local people who deserve recognition. Who do you think is worthy? Go beyond science as well into music, poetry and drama.

During the past four centuries Wales and Welshmen (mostly, unless you have more information!) have developed some astounding work of international significance. We should be proud of them. We live amongst the work of giants and we don't seem to notice.

#### **Environment Minister confirms no changes** to Designated Landscapes

(From the Assembly Government site)

Minister for Environment, Hannah Blythyn, has given a firm commitment that all Wales' existing Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty and National Parks will be retained and their current purpose of conserving and enhancing natural beauty will not be weakened.

Speaking to AMs today, Tuesday 13 March 2018, the Minister confirmed the designated landscapes review process, which has been ongoing since 2013, will draw to a close with the publication of a policy statement in the coming months.

In May 2017, the Future Landscapes Working Group, chaired by Lord Dafydd Elis-Thomas, published a review of Wales' National Parks and Areas of Outstanding National Beauty (AONBs).

The Group was established to explore the recommendations of the Marsden Report into the future of Wales' designated landscapes, which provided 69 wide-ranging recommendations.

During a plenary debate last June, the future protection of Wales' designated landscapes under the current Welsh Government was called into question.

Today the Minister sought to reassure all concerned parties the Welsh Government will not be changing the purposes of National Parks or AONBs.

In an Oral Statement in the National Assembly, Hannah Blythyn said:

"Designated landscapes have been in a state of review since a draft policy statement was consulted on in 2013.

"Today I want to settle some of the key questions on the Government's position and to give this Assembly the opportunity to get a sense of my priorities before I publish a policy statement in the coming months which will bring the review process to a close.

"I welcome the thorough and thought provoking reviews and reports of Professor Marsden and his panel and Lord Elis-Thomas and the Future Landscapes Working Group.

"The process of review has ingrained a new way of working between Parks, Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty and stakeholders where they now share a much greater understanding of the national priorities which they can help to address by working together.

"My priority over the coming months will be to work with the Park Authorities and AONB partnerships on our contemporary Welsh approach to ecosystems and landscapes, while recognising the enduring value of their original purpose. (continued page 4)

#### **ELM TREE FELLED**

## WHAT IS THE GENERAL DATA PROTECTION REGULATION (GDPR)?

The Data Protection Act is being replaced by the General Data Protection Regulation. It is complex but basically says that personal data will be processed lawfully, fairly and transparently; only being used for the purpose you are aware of and no other i.e. used to send you your Newsletter but not to allow other organisations to send you begging letters. Only the minimum accurate, up to date data necessary should be used, not kept for longer than necessary and that storage is safe and secure.

There are several bases for processing data of which consent is one, others being legal obligation (e.g. processing Gift Aid) or legitimate interest (e.g. maintaining lists of Society Members). You have a right to know the data held about you and ask for it to be deleted if you wish. The only data we hold is what you enter on your membership form and no one outside the Society has access to it. Some members may have completed forms many years ago so as subscriptions are renewed this April/May we will take the opportunity to check you are happy with the data held, how we contact you and let you have a copy of our Data Policy Notice.

#### **Environment Minister confirms** no changes to Designated Landscapes (continued from page2)

"I am committed to ensuring Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty and National Parks are valued for their natural beauty by our people, communities and country and our designated landscapes deliver rich ecosystems, vibrant and resilient communities and opportunities for outdoor recreation for all of the people of Wales."

That is the complete statement from the new Minister Hannah Blythyn. I wouldn't usually quote something in full but this sea change seems sufficiently important to do

It will be interesting to see how matters develop. On 30th March the Minister announced an extra £3.4 million for improvements to Designated Landscapes, the sum being controlled centrally I presume. This welcome investment though must be viewed in light of the potential swingeing cuts to the National Park Authority budgets e.g. £800k in Snowdonia over the next two years, with redundancies in view. National Parks 'make £1bn for Wales, to threaten that while English National Parks seem to be protected would not appear sensible. And let's not forget our Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty, where cuts have been even greater.

#### Cae Glan-y-Mor

You may remember the field on the edge of the Straits, on the way to Llanfair PG.

Planning permission for a Zorb Site was turned down, eventually last year, by the Council thanks to the heartfelt protests of local residents, societies, our Councillors, AM and MP. Its importance as an AONB and iconic viewpoint was deemed too important for its intrinsic value and also for its contribution to the economy of the area to contemplate change. is now for sale for £130,000, roughly double its agricultural value.

#### Third Crossing of the Straits -Consultation.



It will be interesting to see what the results of the consultation come up with. It could of course directly affect the area , Cae Glan y Mor. Our view was the consultation was flawed - rather like the Pylon Consultation i.e. where do you want the pylons to go, not do you want pylons in the first place? The single span was preferred as being

least visually intrusive but in general it was thought too expensive and unnecessary especially in times of uncertainty e.g. will Wylfa actually go ahead, after Brexit will traffic to/from Ireland avoid the UK altogether and sail direct?
