The Pier Garden Project - work begins replanting Gardens.

If you've been for a Christmas/Boxing Day walk down by the Pier in Menai Bridge you'll have seen that the 'gardens' have changed. The Pier Project is underway with clearance of some of the laurel bushes, thickets of brambles and rubbish. Many thanks to our members, who live nearby and

to other local residents for their input and for keeping an eye on the area. And indeed to Civic Soc. Committee Members Kevin and Alison Wood for initiating the project. Planting with palm trees has begun and in the


Spring additional planting of ground cover will begin. The Civic Society is undertaking this work with the support of funding from Aethwy Alliance, this grant aid has been key to starting the Project but the renovation of benches and installation of new ones is costly and we'll be looking for further funds. Huge thanks go also to the staff and pupils at David Hughes School for their highly creative design ideas which

we are aiming to incorporate. Note. The promenade, below the Gardens, was opened in 1904 by David Lloyd

George, then MP for Caernarvon Boroughs.

Swan Success.

A little further on from the Pier, along Fordd Cynan towards Beaumaris, you'll come across the walkway over to Ynys Faelog. The Island is private property but the walkway isn't. Please ignore the gate, labelled 'Permitted Access'. The Society has registered this as a Public



Footpath and awaits the consideration of the application by the County Council. The walkway, used by generations of Menai Bridge residents and visitors is open up to a larger green metal gate—not that this would bother the recent visitors shown above. The Mute Swan family successfully raised 5 young this year and can be seen from time to time on the outskirts of the town. With a wingspan of 2 metres and protective of his brood I decided to view from the roadway this time!

What looks like sloppy mud, in the background of the picture, is just that. However, many years ago it was a boat building and repair yard. The old tin shed is all that remains of Olivers' Boatyard and the recent gales have damaged that too.

NATIONAL AND CIVIC TRUST NEWS Call Out for Candidate Sites

In our last Newsletter I mentioned that the 'Call Out' for Candidate Sites was due to start in December 2024 for a period of 6 weeks. What's happening in Anglesey? From 31st March 2023 Anglesey and Gwynedd Council went their different ways and now each Council will produce a Local Development Plan, instead of the Joint Local Development Plan. Gwynedd County Council's process is well advanced with submissions (for candidate sites) to be completed by 15th January 2025. It would be useful to know what date is proposed for Cyngor Sir Ynys Môn. Thank you to Cllr. Robin Williams for arranging to have this raised in the Planning Committee in January 2025. What was proposed in the past Local Development Plan , as 'Candidate Sites'? Are these sites carried forward or does potential protection for sites have to be applied for again?

In Menai Bridge for example we had proposed, amongst others:

- Land adjacent to Tyddyn Isaf protection
- Land at Silver Gates (by telephone exchange) housing

- Land at Four Crosses mixed development
- Land off Mount Street housing
- road down Dew Street to provide one-way system
- Green Wedge between Menai Bridge and Llanfair PG
- Cae Waun wildlife area

For some of these we know that development has taken place. Other major sites in Menai Bridge haven't appeared in Candidate Site lists at all. The derelict Moreia Chapel site in the centre of town, is one such. This site could have such a positive affect on the Town if developed sympathetically and quite the reverse if it is not. We are lucky in Menai Bridge to have a (nearly) full High Street of independent shops and cafes, many cafes. Would a national/multi national shop or store close down independent retailers? Do you want more green spaces, multi storey flats, low cost housing, another petrol station? What would benefit the Town most.? What do we need? Look at page 4 to see what the Welsh Assembly Government says we lack.

Before/after repairs - two sides of the same column, December 2024. Good to see work progressing. Will the pedestrian walkways be renewed? Will it be finished in time for the 200th Anniversary in 2026? Embarrassing if

it's not. **Rhun ap lorwerth** commented recently, "But we're also told that traffic management will be more restrictive than originally planned during the latter stages of the work, with lights in place 24 hours a day, seven days a week. This will add significantly to the disruption for local people. "It's vital that Welsh Government now move quickly on proposals to make the Britannia Bridge as resilient as possible, especially over next year's summer months. I will continue to hold both them and the contractors to account and ensure this work is completed safely, but in as short a time as possible."

Welsh Index of Multiple Deprivation (WIMD) 2019

The official measure of relative deprivation for small areas in Wales

Welsh Index of Multiple Deprivation

- snappy title isn't it! **WIMD** for short isn't much better but it's something we ought to be more familiar with. The Welsh Index of Multiple Deprivation is the Welsh Government's official measure of relative deprivation for small areas in Wales. It is designed to identify those small areas where there are the highest concentrations of several different types of deprivation.

The last index was published in 2019. The Welsh Government is currently planning for an updated index to be published in late 2025. The individual indicators underlying WIMD are the building blocks for the whole index and, following a review of available data. The Govt. proposes to update most indicators and potentially add some new indicators for WIMD

Deprivation is the lack of access to opportunities and resources which we might expect in our society. WIMD is currently made up of eight separate domains (or types) of deprivation, each compiled from a range of different indicators. An area is multiply deprived if, for more than one of these domains, the area has a concentration of people experiencing that type of deprivation, covering:

income, employment, health. education, access to services, community safety, physical environment,

Each type or domain is measured for each of the Lower layer Super Output Areas (LSOAs) in Wales (about 1900).

I can feel your eyes glazing over now but stay with it! If I said, for instance that Cadnant and Tysilio electoral wards in Menai Bridge are LSOAs. Cadnant is the what you might call the old part of the town. In 2019 the report said, amongst much else that Cadnant was ranked as

one the most deprived areas in Anglesey and the Country (within 0-10%) with regard to Community Safety. i.e. ranked 87th out of 1909 areas in the whole of Wales (see the chart below) Community Safety being measured by reference to Police Recorded criminal damage, Violent Crime, anti-social behaviour, theft, burglary and fire incidents. For Housing, Cadnant ranked in the 10-20% most deprived areas nationally (this includes lack of adequate housing due to the physical condition of housing conditions, housing arrangements or availability For other categories it is ranked much higher. Do you believe in statistics anyway? Quoting from the Royal Statistical Society's own website, "There are lies, damned lies and statistics, the saying goes. Whatever the issue, whether it's Brexit, football or health tips, numbers can be plucked to suit each side of the argument. But while it's easy to lie with figures, it is even easier to lie without them.

With statistics, once somebody puts a number in front of you, you can pick holes in it and really analyse whether it stands up or falls apart."
