Information Technology Safety Measures

What action has the Government taken? The Online Safety Act 2023 (the Act) protects children and adults online. It puts a range of new duties on social media companies and search services, giving them legal duties to protect their users from illegal content and content harmful to children. As of 17 March 2025, platforms have a legal duty to protect their users from illegal content online. Ofcom are actively enforcing these duties and have opened several enforcement programmes to monitor compliance. As of 25 July 2025, platforms have a legal duty to protect children online.

Good there is improved protection from illegal content but does that include the use of information about you by Web tracking, location tracking, cross-device tracking, browser finger printing etc., etc. i.e. the sale and exploitation of your personal data. No? How do you navigate that? Pay extra for non trackable access, get professional advice? Sites on the Internet are full of advice, such as,

'To protect your online information, use strong, unique passwords with a password manager and enable multi-factor authentication (MFA). Keep your software and devices updated and use reputable antivirus software don't overshare on social media.....

But would you be better looking at the Government

Website as well — The National Cyber Security Centre <https://www.ncsc.gov.uk/collection/top-tips-for-staying-secure-online>

Time was if you wanted to discuss your finances you went to see a Bank Manager, you paid bills in cash or wrote a cheque (remember those?); if you wanted information you looked it up in a Cyclopaedia or went to the Library. Professional librarians are governed by professional membership of the Chartered Institute of Library and Information Professionals (CILIP). A CILIP member is "part of a professional community, dedicated to changing lives through quality information, services and expertise." Menai Bridge Library is one of the most used on Anglesey, long may it continue.

He also excelled at football and golf (scoring 3 'holes in one'). John retired as head of Business Studies in 'Bangor Tech' in 1987 and his keen interest in local history and the 'goings on' in

For the purposes of this short article I will look further at the [book loan system](#). You had to apply to join the Library, part of the Community Centre opened in 1905. When approved you could then borrow books.

Each book was given a unique reference number which was entered on a small pad of paper (smaller on a match box) with the reference number pasted on the end. When you took out a book your name was written on the paper pad (in minute handwriting), which was reversed to show blue colouring in the storage rack. You couldn't take the book away but were then allowed to take it to the reading room. Reference books were expensive. Newspapers, local magazines, information about national and international politics were available. Children were not allowed in the Newborough Library initially.



Sir John Pritchard-Jones, as he became in 1910, was a friend of David Lloyd George and they frequently travelled down to London together; Sir John to the 'department store' Dickins and Jones, and Lloyd George to Parliament. He played a prominent

role in movements advocating for the promotion of workers' welfare, as well as supporting profit-sharing schemes for his employees. Additionally, he served as the Treasurer of the Welsh National Museum and was a member of the Council of the North Wales University College at Bangor. He generously contributed to the college and became Vice-President of the College Council in 1909. In recognition of his contributions, the University of Wales bestowed an honorary doctorate. The 'PJ Hall' is named after him.

Sir John would have known the Davies Family from Menai Bridge, shipowners, merchants and also proponents of access to education and information for all through the Institute in Menai Bridge (now the War Memorial Community Centre of course). When I say for all, I wonder how many women it included in those days? The membership records still exist for Newborough; it would be interesting to find out. The Davies Family as business people, however, did have a more thrifty reputation when it came to wages for those they employed.

Sadly the Library in Newborough closed in 2022. The phrase, 'Would have turned in his grave', comes to mind!

Whose Information?

Does lack of library access matter? Don't we all have computers or mobile phones these days? The answer is, 'Yes', to both. It's hard to distinguish where the lines can be drawn, if at all, between communication/learning/business and sales today.

Our use of computers is analysed; poured over by the use of logarithms, Web tracking, location tracking, cross-device tracking, browser finger printing etc., etc. We're given access to programs and data but it's not free, it comes at a price and that price is information about you/us/ the users. Where we live, what we eat, what we wear, where we go on holiday, how we pay our bills..... In addition of course to your phone number, email address, location and the type of devices you use.. "This data can be exploited by advertisers and (hopefully not nefarious) others."
